




Performing

Trip to Morrisons


We had a fantastic trip to Morrisons. We explored different food counters and used our shopping list to buy food to take back to school.

"We are here to be your friend".






During Art we have been exploring the work of Joseph Turner. We practised the skills needed to create a wash with watercolours in the style of his work. We then used these skills to extend one of













During term 1, we have been learning about the Romans. Take a look at our Roman shields.

We practised testudo formation and prepared for battle!









Using computers and library books we researched Julius Caesar and created a fact file. We have also explored the origins of Rome though the myth of Romulus and Remus. We reported on this with newspaper articles.







In term 2 we had the exciting opportunity to visit a primary source of history, in the form of Fishbourne Roman Palace!

Our Roman workshop was hands on and Interesting! We found out what life was like For rich and poor Romans.

We explored the museum and the grounds (despite the rain) and all in all, had a spectacular day.



The first two terms of year 5 have been very busy and successful. The children have enjoyed a range of activities throughout the curriculum.



In term 1 we combined our knowledge of how the Tudor rose was formed with learning how to sew. As you can see, we have whole range of beautiful roses decorating the classroom.

In term 2 we used measuring, addition and subtraction to work out how to construct a model of a Tudor house. We then used a hacksaw to carefully cut the wood before we assembled the structure. After that, we had to design the walls and roof so that it looked like a Tudor house.

In Maths, we are working on developing an understanding of how and where Maths is used in the real world. This is something we are continuously revisiting with the children to remind them of how important Maths is.

The majority of Year 6 have settled in well to their new routines and Year 6 expectations. This is the year that we have to prepare to transition to Secondary School, so Year 6 pupils are focusing on their attitudes to learning and working hard to obtain and remember all the skills they have acquired over the years at Seaford Primary School. So far, they have worked extremely hard and we are proud of their efforts particularly those that are listening carefully to their individual targets and are responding with maturity and resilience!

ROAR 2023



This year we entered our Year 6 pupils into a competition called 'ROAR 2023'. Its intention was to promote an entrepreneurial spirit for all students, unlocking their innovative DNA. We asked the children to create a 'World Changing Idea'.

The competition provided an excellent education opportunity to all students to build confidence in speaking, listening and teamwork skills. It enhanced our curriculum in literacy, maths, science, DT, citizenship and RSHE and drove an entrepreneurial spirit across Year 6.

Above all - it was fun!

They had to work in small teams and create a prototype of an invention that they had designed thinking about its impact on civilisation. They had to consider how it would impact the lives of others, how it would be constructed, detailed and also consider an advert and jingle to go with it! They then had to present their ideas to their class and a winner from each class was selected via a private ballot.

Shortly after, David Skinner, the Roar officer from Uckfield and District lions club, attended our school to select a Seaford Primary winner and their video was shared locally in our district by the ROAR team.

Last week, we found out that the winners of Seaford Primary- Jemima Keysell, Scarlett Hiles and Kaarina Anderson-King from 6TR came 1st in the South East district.

We are so proud of them! Well done girls!

Year 6 have taken part in a range of sporting events outside of school including rugby, football and cross-country competitive activities over these two terms. It is a great to see such enthusiasm for these sporting events

Mr Chapman was particularly impressed with how the children worked as a team, supported each other and enjoyed the events. In the Girls' Under 11 tournaments, at the Sussex FA Ground, Worthing, Sukie was top scorer with 4 goals. Ellis and Finn were also noted as having stand-out performances during the tag-rugby festival.

Performing Arts Club started in term 2 and the children attended after school on a Friday, started to practice for the Christmas play creating scenes and taking on acting, dancing, and stage production roles including using the lights and sound.

We look forward to performing this to parents on Thursday 14th July 2023 at 9.30am on the last week of term.

Our Christmas play is titled 'The Christmas Truce' and is a Christmas musical re-telling of the story set in WW1. German and English soldiers are reminded of the importance of humanity and at a time such as Christmas; the war ended for a short moment and they played a game of football. We are reminded of how war effects family and friends and we see how people come together through love and kindness. Our play signals the ending of our topic of War as we head into our second topic — Natural Disasters for terms 3 and 4.
